PanPastels - what are they & how do they work?

PanPastels are a wonderful addition to the pastel family, offering some unique and appealing possibilities. Lovely semi-transparent layers can be created, resulting in subtle and complex colors. In addition, PanPastels are far less dusty, and the gossamer thin layers can easily be erased, leaving paper that looks almost untouched. Deborah will also show the Sofft tools and sponges that come with the Pans, as well as the new trays that will be out soon.

Deborah will show some of her paintings using PanPastels on various papers, and do some hands-on mini-demonstrations so you can see the versatility of this product, including how to: lay in a background; paint layers; add details with PanPastels tools; mix the colors.

Recognized for painting landscapes in pastels, Deborah has been an artist for 25 years. An art instructor in Albuquerque, she now has two workshops available online at ArtistsNetwork.tv or on DVD: *Get Started in Pastels: Deborah Secor Paints the Landscape* and *Painting Shadows in the Landscape with Deborah Secor*. She writes for *The Pastel Journal*, *Watercolor Artist* and *The Artist's Magazine*. Deborah plans to bring some of her CDs for sale, although they do not feature Pan Pastels.

Member News



Bill Baker

Bill Baker, noted for pastel studies of primitive people, gave a presentation of his recent work. Having watched him demonstrate several years ago, I was most eager to see what changes time had wrought. In the past he had been a nomad traveling on his trusty motorcycle into Mexico's Copper Canyon wilderness. The Tarahumara Indians still lived there, like their ancestors had long before the Spanish arrived. They were Bill's favorite subjects. This time, he discussed his theories and displayed some of his work. This takes a lot of courage when the audience is as knowledgeable as the members of PSNM.

He brought five paintings, to provide the fuel for a brief lecture followed by a Question & Answer period. His assistant was a timekeeper – his young son, armed with a large pocket watch, and forewarned to alert his father about the passage of the hour without interrupting any of the dialogue. The result was a casual relaxed all-in-the family feeling that was refreshing after the more formal atmosphere of most art presentations.

Bill is still motivated by the nobility of the human spirit in the people of Copper Canyon and remote Peruvian mountains. Pastels are his painting medium because their rich glowing colors help to convey his energy and the strength of his subjects better than other mediums. He explained his paintings were not the result of formal art studies, since he was prepared for another type of career back in New York City, but from his extensive independent study of paintings in museums.

Now Bill Baker is surer of his ability and has grown in painting skill. The only change that I noticed from his past demonstration was he paints on white pastel paper instead of black. When he feels that the ground should be toned, he swishes a colored pastel over the paper and sets it with water applied with a large flat brush. He prefers Great American brand pastels, avoids fingertip blending because this he believes it makes hues dirty. Although he says he paints landscapes frequently, he still favors portraits. All five of his paintings featured portraits and most had a hint of landscape in the background.

"I dislike using PINK or premixed flesh tones", he said. "I use unusual hues, lots of siennas and some umbers when painting skin tones. What I am painting is light and SHAPES". A glance at his paintings reveals the use of strong light and dark shadows create a feeling of solidity and design more appropriate for his subjects than traditional flesh tones. His subjects are simple country folk, not sophisticated polished city dwellers. All of his colors are extremely clean and pure because he does not layer or use a fingertip to blend. It contributes to the brightness of his work and helps convey the simplicity of his subjects.

Bill Baker stresses the importance of careful drawing of shapes. He uses photos of his subjects enlarged to 8 x 10 inches or larger. He uses his computer to help him. Once he has the shapes right, he says he does not need much detail. His shapes tell the story in a realistic mode. He feels the colors in the painting are like the notes in a

musical composition. You need not read music in order to appreciate the combination of sounds made by various musical instruments.

He would like to be more abstract than realistic when painting, but his use of shapes and patterns of his sitters clothing is quite abstract. I doubt if he would be able to express the strength and simple lifestyle of these Indians honestly were his paintings more abstract. His subjects have a solid massive feeling – like they are part of the very earth on which they stand.

Each piece was a superb Intermediate Major composition of color and value. The dominant color value and intensity range were intermediate (between steps 4 – 7 on a 10-step Gray Scale). There were lots of powerful rich dark colors, including black and enough contrasting off-whites to charge each painting with energy. Colors bounced off one another and were reflected on the skin tones. Shapes and colors in backgrounds were subdued and value contrasts muted, so that they stayed in the background.

The portrait of a man nearly silhouetted against a blue sky was a beautiful example of tension and informal balance, similar to Andrew Wyeth's Christina's World. Baker had placed the man's profile at the extreme the left and filled the rest of the painting with sky. The Peruvian shepherd was looking at the sky. The composition was tied together by reflected color – the man's cheek reflected the blue sky he faced and blue bounced along his collar edge to a spot in the back of the collar. If that blue had not bounced and reflected, not only would the unity of the composition been destroyed, but the meaning of the painting been lost. The implication being we sometimes forget that people living in remote places still observe the sky to determine the kind of weather which is coming because it may mean the difference between near starvation and plenty of food on the table.

When the little timekeeper signaled that the program was nearly over, Bill Baker summarized his lecture, stressing the importance of drawing and using pure colors without layering or blending to keep them clean. He invited the audience to come up on stage so they could examine his paintings close up. It was with considerable reluctance we allowed him to leave with his display pieces.
